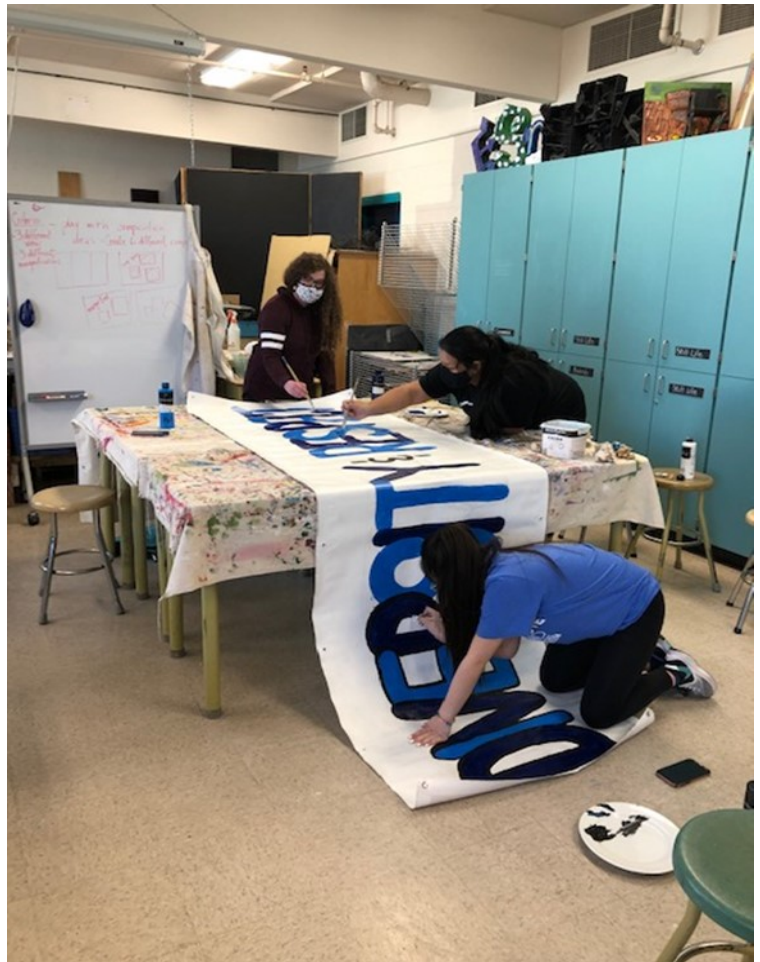

COURSE PLANNING INSTRUCTIONS



Aldergrove Community Secondary School COURSE SELECTION ONLINE INSTRUCTIONS

All course requests for the 2021/2022 school year are being completed online. Please carefully follow the instructions below. Course requests are to be completed by **Monday, February 22, 2021**. If you want to make changes later, you may submit multiple corrected course requests online until February 25.

1) Go to the following website: <https://www.mveducation.gov.bc.ca/aspen/logon>

2) You will need to use the following log-in ID and password.

Login ID: Your 6 digit student number
Password: default is Student\$35

3) The first time you log-in you will be prompted to change your password. Enter your current password, enter a new password, and confirm the new password. Click on OK.

Password Requirements

- Minimum length is 8
- At least one number
- At least one capital and lowercase letter
- At least one symbol that isn't a letter or number
- Can't contain 'password', login name, first name, middle name, last name, date of birth, personal id, or only sequential letters or numbers

4) The system requires that you enter your email address and select a security question.

5) To enter your course selection, first select the “MyInfo” tab at the top of the page.

6) Once here, carefully read the home page instructions specific to your grade at the top of the page.

7) To make course selections click on “Select” and then choose your course.

8) If you were unable to complete your course selections with the options in the on-line course selection sheet, you can leave a note for the counsellor at the bottom of the page.

9) To confirm that you have completed your course selections click on the **POST** button in the bottom left of the screen. **YOU MUST COMPLETE THIS STEP TO SUBMIT YOUR COURSE REQUEST.**

10) If you have not completed all areas of the course selection sheet as required, a warning message will appear. Read the warning carefully and return to the areas identified to correct any items missed in your course selection. Click on the **POST** button again once corrections have been made. A **GREEN** Message will appear when course selections have been successfully posted.



Applications are being accepted for the ACSS AVID Program for any available spots in the AVID 10, 11 and 12 classes for the 2021-2022 school year. Application forms are available in the Counselling office or can be downloaded from the ACSS AVID website and are due on March 1st, 2021.



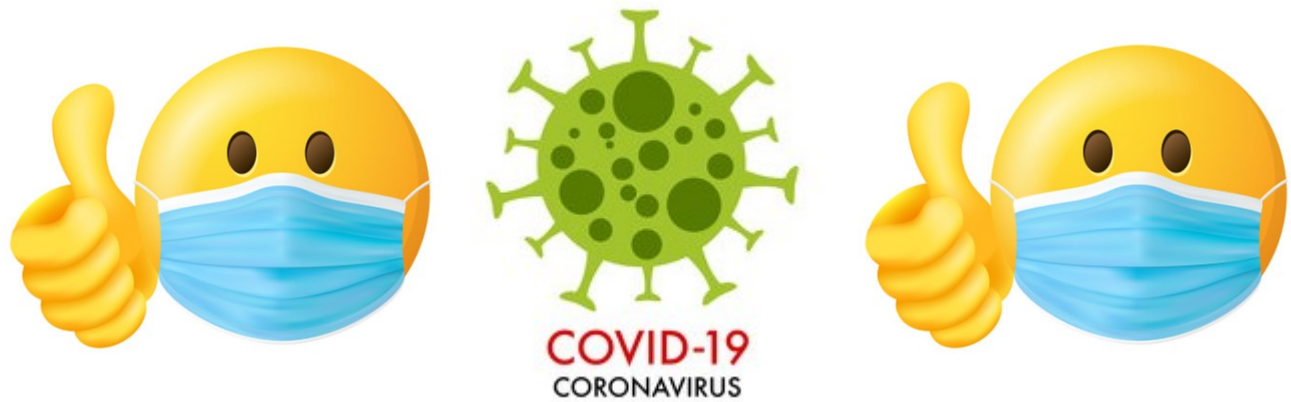

Enhanced Safety Measures for K-12 Schools

The District appreciates all the hard work from students, staff, and families in helping keep our community safe. We continue to work closely with the Ministry of Education and Provincial Health Office. This week the province announced changes to COVID-19 health and safety guidelines for schools. Mask requirements for middle and secondary school students and K-12 staff have been amended. Guidelines have also been strengthened for physical education and music classes.

It is important to note, our schools will need some time to implement these new changes; all changes will be in effect as of February 26, 2021. Your continued patience and support are appreciated. If you have any questions, please contact the school.

Changes to Mask Wearing

All middle and secondary students and K-12 staff will now be required to wear non-medical masks in all indoor areas, including when they are with their learning groups. The only exceptions are when:

- sitting or standing at their seat or workstation in a classroom;***
- there is a barrier in place; or***
- they are eating or drinking.***

For elementary students, wearing masks indoors remain a personal choice.

It is important to note, as advised by the province, these changes above do not apply to grade 6 and 7 students attending an elementary school.

Changes to Physical Education and Music Classes

High-intensity physical activities are to be held outside as much as possible. Shared equipment or items, such as weight machines, treadmills or musical instruments, can be used only if they are cleaned between use, according to strict school sanitization guidelines. Students using equipment or playing instruments should also be spaced at least two metres apart and masks are to be used when singing.

Student Safety Around Schools

With the days growing shorter and the weather changing to rain, fog, and frost, Aldergrove Community Secondary is reminding all our students to take extra precaution when walking to and from school. Please be aware of your surroundings, walk on the sidewalk and with someone whenever possible, and avoid wearing headphones. We also ask drivers in our school community to be vigilant on our roads. Student safety is our priority. Thank you for your cooperation and support in keeping everyone safe.

Information About School Status During Inclement Weather

Snow closures and power outages are an annual occurrence in Langley School District. So, where do you go to get information about the status of schools during periods of inclement weather? If you are able to access the internet via computer or smartphone, current information about Langley schools can be accessed on all school websites or www.sd35.bc.ca. Updates are also posted to Twitter @LangleySchools and Facebook at www.facebook.com/langleyschooldistrict. If you don't have internet connectivity but your phone is working, call a relative or friend in an area that has not been affected by the storm and ask them to check the district website for you. Local radio stations are also informed of school status in Langley. Tune in to CKWX 1130AM, CKNW 980AM, Country Radio 107.1FM, Pulse 107.7 or CBC 690AM or 88.1FM for updates.

Please note that Langley District schools are all considered 'open' until a decision to close is required. Decisions on school closures are usually made by 6:30am. As always, it is a parent's decision whether to send their child to school based on safety and individual circumstances. If you feel it is unsafe for you or your child to travel to or attend an open school for any reason, please keep your child home and report an absence to the school.

School Immunizations

The District has been advised by Fraser Health that school immunizations are expected to take place in January. As in previous years, students in grades 6 and 9 will have the opportunity to be vaccinated. Fraser Health will also provide catch up immunizations to students who did not complete their immunizations last year or over the summer. located at 9734 201 St, Langley.

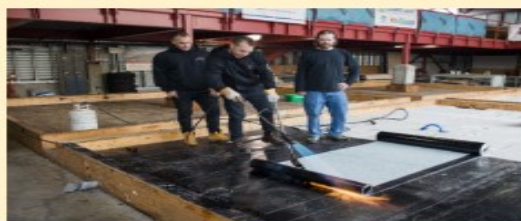


- Roofer (Roofer, Damp and Waterproof) Level 1 apprenticeship training, the first block of technical training toward achieving the nationally recognized Roofer Red Seal.
- Industry Training Authority (ITA) Registration
- Safety training/certification (Fall Protection, Torch Safety, SiteReady/WHMIS, First Aid)
- An introduction to flat roof systems
- An introduction to metal work associated with the Architectural Sheet Metal trade
- The program prepares students to step into their first job on a roofer crew as a Level 1 Roofer apprentice.
- Successful students will be provided an opportunity for employment and apprenticeship.

Important Notes:

- Be prepared to work outside. The training is only partially outside, but the work is ALL outside.
- No tuition cost to students!
- Students/apprentices will only need work clothes and steel-toe work boots for the practical portions of the training. Everything else will be provided.
- This program would replace student's Q4 classes. ****If student has a course in Q4 that they need to graduate, they would have to change that course to Q3.***
- Provides an opportunity to add a Work Experience course to student's schedule. As this program falls within Q4, students could potentially get credit for 3 courses in Q4.
- This program is geared towards Grade 12 students.
- Students must be school age – 18 or younger.

ABOUT AVID

AVID is an elective course intended for students who are academically capable and have a strong desire to be college AND career ready. As a four-year preparatory program, students are expected to enroll each year for Grades 9 to 12. However, students are welcome to apply at any grade level.

It is expected that students who apply to AVID will enroll in the more academically rigorous courses and fill their timetable with enriching elective experiences. It is also expected that AVID students will make the personal commitment of time and energy to achieve acceptance to a post-secondary program that will lead to their career aspirations. This will enable students to have the skills and

experiences to be flexible learners to be ready for life after high school, whether that takes them directly to work, a technical trades program, college, or university.

Students must formally apply for and be accepted in AVID before they can enroll in the course. Acceptance as an AVID candidate will be determined by a committee of teachers who will consider the quality of your application, your record of achievement, attendance, citizenship, personal circumstances, and desire to make the personal commitment to using the strategies promoted in the AVID program in order to maintain a high academic standard.

Langley Teachers' Association Scholarship Guidelines for Students in Secondary Schools 2020 - 2021 School Year

Criteria:

- Registered as a student (full time or part time) in a BC public school
- Accepted to attend an accredited Ministry approved post secondary institution; to be verified by letter from the institution.
- Demonstrated involvement in Social Justice work
- Social justice work involves more than just course work, charity or short-term projects that provide "band aid" solutions. Social justice theory focuses on equity for all and its goal is to encourage systemic change. Applicants will have a demonstrated history of sustained involvement within the school and/or community in the areas of social justice, equity, leadership and/or social inclusion.

Application Process:

Information packages will be distributed to secondary school counsellors in early March. The application package will consist of:

- a one-page letter of introduction to the LTA Scholarship Committee telling us who you are, what has inspired your career path and what you have been doing in pursuit of your goals
- a completed application form
- two letters of reference from teachers (one at the applicant's current school)
- a letter of acceptance from a post-secondary institution
