Parent Teacher Interviews

Parent Registration - Click on the "*Register*" tab and fill in the registration form to create an account. Once parents have successfully registered, they can login to the system and then must register their students by name.

To Book Appointments -The system will be open from <u>Wednesday, March 3 at 4:00 PM</u> <u>until Tuesday, March 9th at 12:00 PM</u> for you to schedule appointments.

Select Teachers - Parents can schedule appointments for any student that they have added to the system by clicking on the "*Appointments*" button beside the student's name. The parent is then taken to a page where they can select the teachers with whom they wish to meet. Multiple teachers can be selected by using the "*Ctrl*" key on a PC keyboard or the "*Command*" key on a Macintosh keyboard.



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Teacher Appointment Calendars - Parents are shown the calendars of the selected teachers. It also shows appointment times that are unavailable for booking. Parents can select appointment times by simply clicking the check boxes or by clicking in the time block beside the check box. Once an appointment time has been selected, it will change to green. If no appointments are available, click on the *call back* button at the top of the list.

It is not possible for parents to select more than one appointment at the same time or to select more than one appointment with the same teacher. Javascript enabled browsers are required for validation on the screen.

Appointments Booked Successfully - Once the appointments are booked, the screen will display the list of appointments for the student. When the parent dicks on the *"Return to Home Page"* button, they will return to the home page with their students and their appointments listed. They can book additional appointments, or they can book appointments for another student.

Parents with More Than One Student - If a parent has more than one student at the school, the teacher appointment calendars will have an additional feature displayed when the second (or third, etc.) student bookings are made. If a sibling has an appointment booked, the student's name will be displayed for a parent, thus making it easier to book adjacent appointments.

Printing Parent Appointment Schedule - From the home page it is possible for you to generate a PDF document with the list of your appointments. By clicking on the "*Print Appointments*" button a window will pop-up asking the parent what they wish to do with the document. In Internet Explorer, it is recommended that people click the "*Save*" button, save the file and then click "*Open*" to view the file. IE sometimes has a problem downloading and opening PDF documents that are generated from websites.

Click "Open" after the download is complete to view the PDF.

Parent Schedule PDF - The generated PDF will list the appointment times, the student and the teacher with whom the appointment is booked.

If you are having difficulties, you may choose to call the school at 604-856-2521 to book appointments over the phone.

Information About School Status During Inclement Weather

Snow closures and power outages are an annual occurrence in Langley School District. So, where do you go to get information about the status of schools during periods of inclement weather? If you are able to access the internet via computer or smartphone, current information about Langley schools can be accessed on all school websites or <u>www.sd35.bc.ca</u>. Updates are also posted to Twitter @LangleySchools and Facebook at <u>www.facebook.com/langleyschooldistrict</u>. If you don't have internet connectivity but your phone is working, call a relative or friend in an area that has not been affected by the storm and ask them to check the district website for you. Local radio stations are also informed of school status in Langley. Tune in to CKWX 1130AM, CKNW 980AM, Country Radio 107.1FM, Pulse 107.7 or CBC 690AM or 88.1FM for updates.

Please note that Langley District schools are all considered 'open' until a decision to close is required. Decisions on school closures are usually made by 6:30am. As always, it is a parent's decision whether to send their child to school based on safety and individual circumstances. If you feel it is unsafe for you or your child to travel to or attend an open school for any reason, please keep your child home and report an absence to the school.



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IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR GRADUATION 2021

As we approach Spring break, our Grade 12 students, their families, and our schools are starting to think about Graduation 2021 and how we might celebrate our Grads. We recognize that a student's Grade 12 year is a special time. In many ways it represents a culmination of a 13-year journey filled with successes, challenges, and growth. Given our current context and the provincial health restrictions that are in place, it is unlikely that we will be able to host our typical grad events in the same way that we have done in years past. This includes large scale in-person Grad Ceremonies, Grad Banquets, and Dances. Like last year, we will need to be creative in terms of finding ways to celebrate our graduates while at the same time following the health and safety guidelines as set out by our Provincial Health Officer.

Together with secondary school principals, the District has begun the conversation about how to provide meaningful, authentic celebratory experiences for our Grade 12s and their families. We have generated a number of ideas and will be soliciting feedback from Fraser Health in the coming weeks. At this point, we do not have concrete plans that we can share with you, but what we can share is that we are committed to honouring our graduates and ensuring that they get the farewell that they so richly deserve.

Moving forward, our hope is to receive some direction from Fraser Health and our Provincial Health Officers, and then start building plans based on that feedback. As we move through this process, we will be sure to include our graduating students, their families, and our school communities to ensure that we are finding creative ways to honour our graduates.

We will provide another update with respect to graduation and graduation activities in April (after Spring Break) when we have had a chance to collaborate with Fraser Health.

K-12 schools supported by regional COVID-19 rapid response teams

VICTORIA – Six regional COVID-19 rapid response teams are now in place to support K-12 schools and school districts with safety plans and exposure assessments.

"Rapid response teams are a critically important addition to the health and safety measures that are keeping schools safe for students and staff," said Jennifer Whiteside, Minister of Education. "As the pandemic evolves, these teams will help us respond quickly and adapt, where necessary, to ensure best practices are being consistently applied throughout the education sector."

Rapid response teams have representatives from school and public health staff. The teams will:

- work with school, school district and health authority staff to review significant school exposure events, make recommendations and support schools to enhance their safety plans when needed.
- review school or district COVID-19 safety plans and related policies;
- support schools with their implementation and safety plans, as well as communications to students, staff and families; and
- conduct school safety assessments.

The Province is investing \$900,000 in federal funding to support one team for each health authority and one dedicated to support independent schools, including hiring or redeploying health and safety staff.

Lead school districts include:

- Surrey for the Fraser Health region;
- Nanaimo-Ladysmith for the Island Health region;
- Central Okanagan for the Interior Health region;
- Peace River North for the Northern Health region; and
- Vancouver for the Vancouver Coastal Health region.

In Fraser Health, there is also an existing COVID-19 Intake Hub working closely with school districts in the region to respond to exposures. To date, Surrey has already worked with Fraser Health to complete environmental assessments of three schools with exposure events, and those assessments have been shared with all schools in the district.

To support B.C.'s COVID-19 response for K-12 education, \$288 million in provincial and federal one-timing funding has been allocated to schools and districts, including \$3.5 million to manage COVID-19 exposures in schools.

Enhanced Safety Measures for K-12 Schools

The District appreciates all the hard work from students, staff, and families in helping keep our community safe. We continue to work closely with the Ministry of Education and Provincial Health Office. This week the province announced changes to COVID-19 health and safety guidelines for schools. Mask requirements for middle and secondary school students and K-12 staff have been amended. Guidelines have also been strengthened for physical education and music classes.

It is important to note, our schools will need some time to implement these new changes; all changes will be in effect as of February 26, 2021. Your continued patience and support are appreciated. If you have any questions, please contact the school.

Please read below and full details found in the province's news release located on the District website <u>here</u>.

Changes to Mask Wearing

All middle and secondary students and K-12 staff will now be required to wear non-medical masks in all indoor areas, including when they are with their learning groups. The only exceptions are when:

- sitting or standing at their seat or workstation in a classroom;
- there is a barrier in place; or
- they are eating or drinking.

For elementary students, wearing masks indoors remain a personal choice.

It is important to note, as advised by the province, these changes above do not apply to grade 6 and 7 students attending an elementary school.

Changes to Physical Education and Music Classes

High-intensity physical activities are to be held outside as much as possible. Shared equipment or items, such as weight machines, treadmills or musical instruments, can be used only if they are cleaned between use, according to strict school sanitization guidelines. Students using equipment or playing instruments should also be spaced at least two metres apart and masks are to be used when singing.

PARENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES

PARENT-GUARDIAN ADVICE MARCH 2021

During the Conference

- Be on time (or early) for the meeting.
- End the meeting on time. Other parents will probably have a conference after yours.
- Relax and be yourself.
- Stay calm during the conference.
- Ask the most important questions first.
- If your child receives additional support (such as ELL), ask about your child's progress.
- Ask for explanations of anything you don't understand.
- Ask your child's teacher for ways that you can help your child at home.
- Thank the teacher.

After the Conference

- Talk about the conference with your child.
- Talk about the positive points and be direct about concerns.
- Tell your child about any plans you and the teacher created.
- Set realistic goals with your child (only 1 or 2).
- Keep in touch with the teacher during the school year.

Before the Conference

- Clarify with the teacher whether it would be best to attend with or without your child.
- Ask your child how she feels about school.
- Ask your child if there is anything that they want you to talk about with their teacher.
- Tell your child that you and the teacher are meeting to help them.
- Make a list of topics that you want to talk about with the teacher.
- Prepare a list of questions such as:
 - 1. What are my child's strengths?
 - 2. What is an area of concern?
 - 3. Is my child engaged in class?
 - 4. Does my child seem happy at school?
 - 5. What can I do at home to support my child?

Ask and Answer Questions About Your Child's Life

May I tell you about my child?

No one knows your child better than you do, so it's your job to help your child's teacher learn more. Provide your child's teacher with more information on what motivates your child, likes and dislikes, special skills, strengths and challenges.

May I tell you about what's going on at home?

Situations like illness, divorce or a new baby may affect your child's school experience, so inform your child's teacher of such circumstances. Even knowing if the child goes to one home on certain days and another home on other days can be helpful. If home life circumstances change dramatically in between conferences, be sure to drop your child's teacher a note to let them know.

How is my child doing socially?

The way the child functions socially in the class is a topic that should be addressed at a conference, so inquire about your child's peer relations. A child's social development is just as important as their academic development, and your child's teacher will have made useful observations they can share with you.

It's important to know if your child interacts well with the other children. Are they a good friend? Do they help out if another student is struggling? These are all important skills that go into measuring a child's overall development.

How is my child doing emotionally?

It's important to ask about your child's emotional health at school. For example, is your child generally happy? Are there certain times of the day when your child seems stressed out or agitated?

What are my child's academic strengths and weaknesses?

Your child's teacher sees your child from a different perspective than you do. Ask the teacher what personal challenges your child needs to work on and listen to the response with an open mind. Ask about their strengths, as well, so you can encourage them to continue doing good work. Parents often have higher academic expectations for children than the teacher does, particularly early on in the year, so getting the teacher's perspective can be eye-opening.

Is my child performing on grade level?

At a conference, parents should expect to see examples of their child's work. Parents should ask "how this compares to grade-level expectations," but don't try to compare your child to other students. Each child is different and has different strengths and learning abilities.

Teachers will absolutely let parents know if they are concerned that a child is falling below grade level, so this isn't something to get too hung up on unnecessarily. The most important thing here is to know if your child's performance is where it should be, and your child's teacher will be able to tell you that definitively.

Ask and Answer Questions About Your Child's Life

Does my child need extra help in any areas?

Your child's teacher can tell you if your child is falling behind in a skill or a subject, like Math or English. Work with your child's teacher to create a plan to help your child progress well in school. There may be specific things you can do at home to help, such as hiring a tutor or helping with homework.

Questions to Ask if Your Child is Experiencing Challenges in School

May I share a concern?

If you're worried about a situation at school, bring it up with the teacher.

Teachers usually appreciate when parents bring an issue to their attention, as long as it's done with respect. For example, if you're concerned about the amount of time your child is spending on his homework, this is the time to open the discussion with his teacher. Teachers and parents all have the same goal: to do what they can to ensure that the children have a successful school year.

Can you fill me in on a particular situation?

When your child has complaints about what's going on at school, parents should ask for clarification from the teacher, as often your child's side is the only side you've heard.

This can include anything from a peer-to-peer issue or a teacher that your child is having trouble with. If you don't feel like you're getting anywhere after the conference, contact the principal to deal with specific situations.

Important Questions to End With

How can I help at home to support what you're doing in the classroom?

There might be supplies you can purchase, prep work you can do at home, or skill practice you can work into your child's routine at home.

What's the best way to communicate with you?

Teachers have a lot of students and parents trying to talk to them during any given school day, so it's important to get an understanding of how they prefer to communicate. Some teachers prefer email, phone or face-to-face, while others may use an online tool. Find out which method your child's teacher prefers so that you can communicate questions or concerns to them in the best way.
