



PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear ACSS students and families,

As we move into the Easter long weekend, we are sending well-wishes to all in our school community for a restful and meaningful holiday weekend. Many people in our community are celebrating in different ways. Here are some of the celebrations:

- Vaisakhi started as a harvest festival in the Punjabi region of northern India. It also celebrates the creation of the Khalsa order. It promotes justice and equality and the creation of a more equal and just society. Members commit to wearing the five articles of faith and practice daily meditation. They also have access to their Sikh spiritual guide. Today Vaisakhi is celebrated in Sikh communities around the world. The celebration is held on either April 13 or 14 every year.
- The Jewish festival of Passover is a very special holiday that celebrates the Jewish peoples' freedom from the pharaoh of Egypt over 3,000 years ago. This is a story known as the Exodus. It's the oldest, continuously celebrated holiday of the Jewish calendar. Passover can run for seven or eight days, depending on where you live. This year it begins on the evening of April 15.
- Easter is the holiest day of the year for Christians. It celebrates their belief in the resurrection, or the rising from the dead, of Jesus Christ. Jesus was the founder of the religion of Christianity. Easter is always observed on a Sunday in the spring, but its date varies. It can fall on any Sunday between March 22 and April 25.
- Ramadan is the ninth month of the Muslim calendar and the holy month of fasting. It begins and ends with the appearance of the crescent moon. Because the Muslim calendar year is shorter than the Gregorian calendar year, Ramadan begins 10–12 days earlier each year, allowing it to fall in every season throughout a 33-year cycle. Ramadan lasts from Saturday, April 2 to Sunday, May 1 in 2022. (Dates are dependent on the appearance of the crescent moon and may vary across countries.)

Dear Grade 10 Students and Families:

Last month, the BC Ministry of Education announced the implementation of a new Indigenous Focused Graduation Requirement that will come into effect for the 2023 – 2024 school year. Currently the Ministry of Education is seeking feedback on this new graduation requirement. To learn more about the change in graduation requirement and to provide feedback, please visit the <u>Indigenous Focused Graduation Requirement site</u> that allows feedback until April 22, 2022.

In the Langley School District, we are proud to have strong, positive relationships with our local Indigenous communities. We are honoured to work and learn on the unceded, ancestral and traditional territories of the Matsqui, Kwantlen, Katzie, and Semiahmoo First Nations. As a School District and at Aldergrove Community Secondary School we are committed to Truth and Reconciliation - this curricular announcement from The Ministry of Education provides us with an exciting direction for our course offerings. While we will continue to implement the First Peoples Principles of Learning in all our courses the new Indigenous Focused Graduation Requirement provides us with a focus and commitment towards helping all our learners understand Indigenous worldviews and perspectives, especially in British Columbia and Canada.





PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

The proposed implementation timeline will be for the 2023 – 2024 school year. Under this model, our current grade 10s will be the first group of students required to satisfy this new graduation requirement. At ACSS, we know that our students have a multitude of programs, courses, and opportunities available to them including AVID, Youth Train in Trades, Advance, and many other electives. As we look to implement the new graduation requirement, we want to make sure that this excellent opportunity for Indigenous focused learning aligns with other courses and/or programs. Thus, we have created a path, beginning in 2022-2023, that will satisfy the Indigenous Focused Grad Requirement. English 11 adjustments will be made as follows:

- Creative Writing 11 will become English First People's Literary Studies & Writing 11
- Composition 11 will become English First People's Literary Studies & Writing 11
- New Media 11 will become English First People's Literary Studies & New Media 11
- Students in the Advance program will choose one of the course options.

The above changes will be reflected in the MyEd student course selection information that is used in our course verification process. Thank you for your understanding and thank you to the ACSS English and Social Studies Departments for leading this change.

Photography students joined together this week for a cupcake competition




Photos students





2022 Student Scholarships

The Aldergrove Community Secondary School Parent Advisory Council (ACSS PAC) will award three bursaries to students planning to pursue post-secondary studies.

Students wishing to be considered for a scholarship must be currently enrolled in grade 12 at ACSS and expecting to graduate in June 2022. Each of the three recipients will be awarded a \$500 scholarship.

Scholarship #1: Write an essay telling us how you have persevered through challenging experiences you have faced in the past few years while completing your studies. Explain how the experience has changed the path you were on and/or how it's shaped who you are today.

Scholarship #2: Write an essay telling us how you showed your school spirit and made a contribution to the school community during your year(s) at ACSS. Letters of reference from a current or previous ACSS staff member affirming the applicant's accomplishments is required.

Scholarship #3: Write an essay telling us of your academic achievements and how you balance your school work with your social life and emotional well-being.

Recipients will be announced in mid-spring 2022.





ACSS PAC Scholarship Application - cont'd.

2022 Application Package:

Please include the following information in your package:

- 1. A completed application form showing specific plans for immediate postsecondary academic, technical or vocational education or training.
- 2. Written confirmation from your current school principal or counselor on school letterhead that you will be graduating June 2022.
- 3. Your essay of a minimum of 200 words up to a maximum of 1500 words concerning the question for Scholarship #1, #2, or #3.
- 4. The letter of reference from a current or previous ACSS staff member (for scholarship #2 only).
- 5. The applicant must agree to have their name published in a newspaper, on a website, PAC & school social media
- 6. Nowhere in the essay should the applicant record their name. Failure to adhere to this will result in the essay being removed from consideration.

For the 2021/2022 school year, an award in the amount of \$500 will be given to three students entering in ANY FIELD OF STUDY.



Daily Health Check and What to Do When Sick

A friendly reminder to our students and visitors to complete a daily health check prior to boarding a bus or entering a school or District site such as the School Board Office. To help support families in doing their part to keep everyone safe, please review the **Daily Health Check and What to Do When Sick** guide here. This contains a list of COVID-19 symptoms and guidance on what to do if you become ill. As always, the District is encouraging everyone to continue practice proper handwashing and staying home when sick.

Reporting School Absences

The school appreciates the work of families in following our processes when it comes to reporting student absences. As per Ministry guidelines, students and their families are being asked to indicate if the reason for the absence is due to illness. As per Ministry guidance, students do not need to disclose if their absence is specific to COVID-19; however, those who test positive for COVID-19 should be diligent in ensuring their school is aware their absence is illness-related. Providing us with accurate information regarding the reason your child is away, is extremely critical in helping keep our school community safe. This data will help our school, the District, and Fraser Health work together to assess and make decisions about closures which could impact operations and student learning. The attendance information families provide remains confidential, will not be shared, and is only used for reporting and planning purposes. If you have any questions about reporting absences, please feel free to contact the school.

School COVID Measures

As we continue to ensure that we are all safe and healthy while at school, we ask that you:

- Sanitize your hands whenever you enter or re-enter the building.
- Try to maintain physical distancing in classrooms.
- Do not hang out in the hallways during transitions between classes.
- Wash your hands frequently.

Lessons Learned from COVID-19: Survey

The province has launched an independent review and public consultation on the government's operational response to the COVID-19 pandemic to improve future preparations and responses to emergencies. The goal is to learn about how government agencies worked together to address the effects of COVID-19 that affected everyone and changed rapidly. COVID Procedures for Managing Illness

To help students, staff, and families in the weeks ahead, the District is sharing a document outlining information and public health guidance regarding COVID Procedures for Managing Illness. Please see attached.

COVID-19 Procedures for Managing Illness

January 11, 2022

As shared with the community in the District's Continuity of Learning Plan, Fraser Health's process for contact tracing, case management, and exposure notifications is changing. The former processes that have been in place previously will not continue. This resource will help guide students, staff, and families on public health procedures related to COVID-19. It is important to note, these guidelines/procedures may change.

I am a student or staff who is sick and was at school on a given day. What should I do?

Stay at home until your symptoms are gone. Seek medical attention if needed. Use the <u>BC COVID-19</u> Self-Assessment Tool to determine guidance and recommendations for testing.

If you have any concerns, feel very sick, or your symptoms are not improving, contact your family doctor/nurse practitioner or call 8-1-1.

Students/staff should report their absence at school/work to their administrator. As per Ministry guidance, students and staff do not need to disclose if their absence is specific to COVID-19; however, those who test positive for COVID-19 should be diligent in ensuring their school is aware their absence is illness-related.

2. I am a student or staff who tested positive for COVID-19 either through a rapid test or PCR test. What should I do?

Individuals who test positive for COVID-19 should follow advice from the BC Centre for Disease Control, found here. Please note, guidance and recommendations vary depending on an individual's vaccination status.

As per the BCCDC, if you test positive for COVID-19, you need to do the following:

- Complete an online form to report your test result
- Self-isolate and manage your symptoms
- Let your close contacts know

Students/staff should report their absence at school/work to their administrator. As per Ministry guidance, students and staff do not need to disclose if their absence is specific to COVID-19; however, those who test positive for COVID-19 should be diligent in ensuring their school is aware their absence is illness-related.

3. Why is there no contact tracing or exposure notifications in K-12 schools?

The Omicron variant spreads rapidly and, as such, contact tracing is a less effective measure in the timely management of COVID-19. Public Health is no longer able to contact everyone who tests positive.

As Public Health is not contacting every person who tests positive, school exposures will not be issued by Public Health for individual cases. In the event of a declared outbreak, Public Health will issue a public notification.

Public Health will continue to work with schools if, for example, there is a significant increase in absenteeism that is atypical for the time of year and actions are to be taken, such as notification to the parents and guardians of the affected grade or school community.







Information About School Status During Inclement Weather

Snow closures and power outages are an annual

occurrence in Langley School District. So, where do you go to get information about the status of schools during periods of inclement weather? If you are able to access the internet via computer or smartphone, current information about Langley schools can be accessed on all school websites or www.sd35.bc.ca. Updates are also posted to Twitter @LangleySchools and Facebook at www.facebook.com/langleyschooldistrict. If you don't have internet connectivity but your phone is working, call a relative or friend in an area that has not been affected by the storm and ask them to check the district website for you. Local radio stations are also informed of school status in Langley. Tune in to CKWX 1130AM, CKNW 980AM, Country Radio 107.1FM, Pulse 107.7 or CBC 690AM or 88.1FM for updates.

Please note that Langley District schools are all considered 'open' until a decision to close is required. Decisions on school closures are usually made by 6:30am. As always, it is a parent's decision whether to send their child to school based on safety and individual circumstances. If you feel it is unsafe for you or your child to travel to or attend an open school for any reason, please keep your child home and report an absence to the school.
