I. Approval of previous minutes

II. School reports:

A. **Principal** – John Hantke

Had lots of fun with the April 1st joke on school for sale, did have some serious concerned emails though.

Grade 5 info days looking at bringing the grade 5 feeder school students to the school every Tuesday and Thursday of May. The students will have a walk through the school and get their shirts. Will have a chance for Erin and resource team leads to talk to the teacher so that they can learn about the students and try to make sure they have a friend in the class for next year.

Will have a Parent info night, with PAC present.

Have shared our incredible successes with the district.

Next year we are projected at having over 750 students, this year we have 690 students.

Significant for we will be gaining 2 or 3 more classes. Will have to look at different spaces that we can utilize, multipurpose room will probably be reverted to a classroom (some renovations will have to be made to that room) along with the art room becoming a classroom.

Next year will lose art as exploration but looking at maybe having Drama or a Digital exploration class. Band is considered a Fine Art class, enrichment as opposed to a required course. Students should not be missing core subjects to attend band. If the band changes to an exploration it would probably look more like a music class then a band.

Proficiency Scale Presentation

Philosophy shift in assessment.

The grading in the past was an evaluation approach which judges quality, whereas the assessment approach helps to increase quality.

Mr. Hantke talked about the book, Austin's Butterfly. A 3rd grade student was asked to draw a butterfly. His 1st attempt was a very rough drawing, which if graded would have been a C, with assessment, Austin was asked to look at his picture and see if changes needed to be made, after several attempts and assessments his butterfly drawing looked just like a real butterfly.

The purpose of effective assessment is to improve student learning and inform teachers practice.

Assessment has ongoing feedback and communication between parents/guardians, students and teachers. Feedback to the parents should be easy to understand. Where the child is in learning, what successes the child has, what areas need to be improved on and what are the next steps.

Ongoing feedback to students encourage them to improve. The Benefits are a focus on learning, support better understanding, encourage student reflection, empower students to learn and raster hope, efficacy and culture of learning.

We should be using words like "you must have worked hard", instead of "you must be smart".

Goal for students is proficient, get them to the door. Developing is the student is in the hallway (long or short) approaching the door. Emerging you are on the stairs not quite in the hallway yet.

Extending is you have walked through the door and now you have a chance to do more things.

Extending does not mean doing more work, doing new work, or doing work at next grade level.

Extending is a student demonstrating learning in relation to learning standards with increasing depth and complexity.

Language to use is concise, strength based, aligned with learning standards, describe student learning and identify areas for future growth.

Extending is when you do something for your own benefit not for a mark, job, etc.

Langley DPAC writes a letter to the Langley School District requesting clarity and understanding on the following:

- 1. Statistical data and report through budget as to how they disperse and/or allocate the funds they receive from the Ministry of Education and Jordan's Principle (if applicable) for students with designations/diagnosis or Neurodiverse Learners to schools within the district to pay for Education Assistants (EA's) and Resource Teachers, including what is moved into contingency funds;
- 2. Rationale/criteria as to how many educational assistants' schools will receive based on the number of designations within each school and need of student(s);

RATIONALE

We understand from our families at our school and neighbouring schools, that there are many students who are not receiving support by means of Education Assistants and/or Resource Teachers in the classrooms due to lack of funding from the district. The shortage in our classrooms affects the mental health and education of our children and staff. On average we believe there is 1-3 children per class who bring in extra funds with their designations to the school district yet these funds are not shown in the staffing to support the children and teachers. At our school we have 6 EAs all of which are 1:1 support for medically fragile students; this leaves the estimated 50 children unsupported.

Instructions to DPAC Reps to bring the motion back to your PACs to determine how they would like to vote at the April meeting. Any questions or new motions can be sent in to DPAC in advance of the April meeting.

Chantale brought motion to the PAC meeting, a vote was held and all were in favour of the motion. Chantale will take our yes, in favour, vote to the April 2023 DPAC meeting.

Summary and Discussion

Feb 8th – PAC meeting - was given update of scoring table not going to be purchased, no other requests given yet as quotes weren't ready

March 1st – Executive meeting – quotes not received yet from the school. Brainstorm of using Gaming Funds for the dance was suggested to put forth in a motion. Since dance event was not a fundraiser and a whole school event. (100% gaming eligible expense) March 10th – An email was sent out to all families giving notice of a proposed motion of taking away \$2000 from scoring table and adding \$1000 to the gaming budget for the dance event to be voted on at the April 12th PAC meeting

- Mr. Wright and Mr. Hantke were not able to make decisions or collect quotes before spring break – I suggested to them that due to time constraints of voting, that extra gaming funds be rolled over for the next year and requests could be ready to put on the budget right away in Sept/Oct

HDS DPAC Rep Report - February 16th, 2023

1. Langley School District Presentation

Professional Learning Collaboration (PLC) / Hubs

- Professional Learning Communities (team approach) and Response to Intervention (action taken, review, revise as needed)
- Based in the District's Strategic Plan
- Systems and Structures / Ensouling our Schools in the Continuous Improvement Plan
- "Collective Teacher Efficacy" #1 Effect size in Hattie's Meta-Analysis (most impactful)
- District Continuous Improvement Plan focused approach built on the foundation of Social & Emotional learning: Creating compassionate classroom communities
- Topped by: Systems & Structures response to intervention and Instructional practice – framework for teaching & learning

John Hattie's Meta Analysis – 0.4 and above is considered impactful Most impactful:

- 1.57 Collective teacher efficacy
- 1.33 Self reported grades
- 1.29 Teacher estimates of achieving
- 1.29 Cognitive task analysis
- 1.29 Response to intervention

PLC and Response to Intervention:

What is it that we want students to learn (curriculum and instruction) How do we know if they have learned it? (assessment) What do we do if they haven't learned it (Intervention: Tier 1,2,3)

What do we do if they have? (Extension / Enrichment)

This all requires a team based approach; no one teacher can accomplish this with each student. Collaboration time builds staff capacity and supports alignment as these questions are answered.

PLC time at Secondary level:

There is already time for collaboration implemented at middle and at most

- elementary schools
- There is complexity at secondary schools due to the timetables so they've been working on these plans over the past 12 months.
- Secondary Plan includes both time for (1) staff collaboration and (2) student interventions / extensions
- 3 schools prepared to implement for Semester 2: ACSS, REMSS and WGSS
- Mandatory for teachers so PLC has to be at a time that all teachers can partake
- Each secondary school working on its own plan with some common elements:
 - Take place on Wednesdays (every 2-3 weeks: 8 days over 5 months)
 - Be between 40 and 56 minutes and be scheduled for either the beginning of day or end of day
 - Some staff will be a part of PLC time to support students while the rest will collaborate and then will rotate / alternate for the following Hub day
 - PLC time will only be curriculum that has already been taught or opportunities to extend
- Students can choose which subject to attend or may be invited by their teacher
- PLC time is optional if students are fully caught up
- Sample activities for Hub Time
 - Staff time to identify essential curricular competencies
 - Staff time to develop and code common assessments
 - Staff time to examine assessment results and identify students who are struggling / succeeding
 - Staff time to provide support for student interventions and / or extensions

Q: Does this replace I-Days at semester turnaround?

A: We recognized that having time at the end of the semester was not ideal so this allows instead several opportunities throughout the semester to catch up or extend

Q: Is this a pilot program that will be reviewed before fully implemented?

A: This will be in every secondary school within ideally the next 12 months or as soon as the individual schools have a solid plan that they are ready to implement well

Q: Is this only Secondary schools?

A: Elementary and middle are already able to work collaboration time into their existing timetables by extending lunch with noon hour supervisors or principals. Secondary is far too complex to implement as easily.

Q: How is this different from CLAWS?

A: CLAWS is student support, but missing teacher collaboration / efficacy

Q: Vanguard has already been doing this.

A: Vanguard and LFA are already on their own unique schedules. This applies to comprehensive high schools since they are all on the same schedule.

Q: Is there another level to PLC where we could also bring in specialists or experts?

A: Not right now, but we do have School Based Team tier 3 supports: psychologists, speech & language pathologists so this could become a natural progression for the use of PLC time.

Q: Hubs are set up so students can come and work with a group of teachers, but how do teachers then collaborate?

A: Staff is split in half: one half helps students, one half collaborates and then rotate each Hub

Q: Are you planning on a certain percentage of students utilizing this?

A: It doesn't have to be a certain percentage or maximum, the concern is that too few students are going to use this. The intention is that this doesn't become just another early dismissal.

Q: Is there an option for peer tutoring at this time?

A: Absolutely: REM is already planning to implement peer tutoring in their Hub days.

Q: If students are up to date and not invited, how do we get them to attend? Is there an incentive for them?

A: This is not currently club time but it could progress to become club time with access to teacher support to evolve into extension learning / passion learning.

Q: If students are finished their work they will feel left out and not welcome. This should be considered as part of inclusivity.

A: This is part of the Universal Design for Learning. How to plan for vast difference in levels of understanding. This is the end of "average". We are promoting and teaching teachers how to teach using UDL and moving toward competency. Alternately, if a teacher sees a student achieving 94%, they can then assess what the student's next step should be to extend beyond that.

Q: ACSS parent perspective: our first Hub day was yesterday. It didn't go well, it ran in the am and students didn't attend. Students that did go did nothing, were told to read a book. Students were told not to come, just sleep in.

A: This is not the same as the feedback received from the school. Good feedback, if pieces didn't work as planned, as reported, the district is very interested in looking into it.

Q: First or last part of the day makes it too easy to not go or leave early.

A: There was a reason RTI / REP was between first and second period; research indicated that was best and it did work. Again here, research indicates that the best time for RTI is beginning or end of day.

Q: Will you look at attendance at the end of Semester 2 and analyze the data?

A: We will review that at the end of the year. All other comprehensive schools are also watching to see how best to implement.

Q: What is the plan for tracking? Is there a mechanism in place? Is there a way for parents to determine what their kids are doing?

A: No attendance being taken though our MyEd system since they are not going to a specific class

Q: How will you know then if this is a success?

A: Report cards. This is how we determined that Flex time was working. We saw the entire population have a positive shift in their grade and knew it was working.

Q: Early dismissal in the morning was not working because kids didn't show up. There has to be some kind of attendance.

A: There is no attendance through MyEd, but students do need to sign in for Hub blocks.

Q: My son is planning on taking advantage of this time. Happy to give a bit of my kid's time up so teachers can collaborate.

Q: At elementary, students only have 10 minutes to eat and are having to choose between lunch hour activities and not eating. This needs to be taken into consideration. A: Fair. At elementary, collab is not at lunch but rather is an extended outside time. Teachers often actually end up collaborating through their own lunch while the kids are outside playing.

Q: Two problems that can solve each other. (1) what are kids doing (2) parents who want to contribute passion as club leader

A: At secondary there may be the potential for this to evolve into clubs.

Questions culled in the interest of time.

Scholarships: Local, School Based and District Authority

- Encourage students to take advantage of these opportunities
- Once you've written one scholarship application, you can re-use; they
 mostly ask what are you passionate about
- Biggest barrier to scholarships is students applying
- Approximately 40 open awards, approximately 28 school based awards (LSS)
- Criteria: 67% average, attend post secondary within 2 years, must have SIN
- Qualifications: career interest, parent / family connections, community / team / association involvement, based on your passions, based on the elementary school you attended
- Take the time to sit down and complete the application; most are now online and are approximately 75 yes / no or short answer questions
 - Have your top 2 career and top 2 post secondary intentions
 - List extra curricular for grades 10 12 and your supervisor(s)
 - List your community involvement and your role(s)
 - Hardship, Financial Need
 - Learning disability or chronic health condition or extenuating circumstances
- Also: District Authority Awards must be Canadian Citizen \$1,250 voucher with up to 5 years to redeem
 - 7 different categories
 - Deadline: Friday, March 3, 2023
- Each school has grade 12 counselling website with link to scholarships
- Mostly based on leadership, not GPA

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RATIONALE

We understand from our families at our school and neighbouring schools, that there are many students who are not receiving support by means of Education Assistants and/or Resource Teachers in the classrooms due to lack of funding from the district. The shortage in our classrooms affects the mental health and education of our children and staff. On average we believe there is 1-3 children per class who bring in extra funds with their designations to the school district yet these funds are not shown in the staffing to support the children and teachers. At our school we have 6 EAs all of which are 1:1 support for medically fragile students; this leaves the estimated 50 children unsupported.

Q: 50 unsupported students; how was that determined?

A: Statistics 1 in 3 estimated 50 IEP – estimated 15 receive funding.

Q: How many hours?

A: We don't know that data and they can't tell us because it's confidential.

Q: This is seen at Blacklock as well. It is evident that there is frustration due to limited time to accomplish goals / meet needs.

Q: Has your PAC already tried to get this info from the district?

A: Yes, Mike Morgan and Principal have been invited to PAC meeting to speak. PAC is still unsatisfied with the result.

Q: Is this an effective use of DPAC time? Should this go directly to BCCPAC?

A: That would be a completely different motion.

Q: Has a letter like this ever come up in the past?

A: DPAC has written letters to municipal bodies but not to the District before and nothing ever on this topic that we know of.

Q: Is the upcoming DPAC parent ed not about this?

A: Yes, but not specifically about funding necessarily.

Q: Not all schools have a March PAC meeting due to spring break.

A: Tisha, are you open to delay the vote on this to the April General DPAC meeting? Yes.

Q: A school is in distress; why don't we just move forward now?

A: That is our process so that everyone in the PAC has a voice.

Ishtar Women's Resouces Society, P.E.A.C.E. Program

Megan Comey and Rena Andronek

Violence is preventable (VIP) Program: Speak to kids around warning signs. Violence and abuse in relationships and how to respond to a friend that might need assistance. All with the lens of an age-appropriate way. They can teach kids as little as kindergarten. Mostly grade 7's and 10's seems to get presentations; however, they are equipped to do others.

- 2-3 kids in each classroom are experiencing /exposed to domestic violence in some way
- If something isn't right. Tell someone. Keep telling people until you get help.
- Megan is seeking an endorsement and looking to speak in classrooms.
- Working within this space for 20 years
- 2017 the program was revamped to be more tech friendly.
- Change in school staff is when they do start to lose schools due to teacher shortages and loss of communications. Their goal is to get into more schools

Q: Do you work closely with child services as well?

A: They do work with a lot of kids, and social workers who have been/ or have been in foster care. It is a voluntary program, but it's not mandated.

Q: How do you manage the conflict with parents, who may not realize there is an issue A: There are very few disclosures in the classroom. Students say things to teachers, or a behavior change happens during the presentation. They do make notes and are available to speak with students post presentation. They do connect and try to support where they can. They can notify teachers to monitor student behavior should parents not wish to receive support. Parents are given resources to choose to seek support.

School District 35 Budget Review, Brian Iseli, Secretary Treasurer

Budget presentation for 2023/2024 fiscal year. Seeking feedback from community on proposals. Overview of the budget process for the school district and three main funds.

- Operating Fund instructional programs, admin, maintenance, facilities, transportation
- Special Purpose Fund specific programs, activities, ministry designated programs and annual facility grant
- Capital Fund land acquisitions, construction, renovations

Revenue: 93% of total revenue comes from province grants. Where tuition (le international students) and rentals make up the remainder.

Surplus money – this occurs when annual revenue exceeds annual expenditure. Feedback from the community is important to receive as this helps us understand where the surplus should be spent.

2022/2023 - very first time that admin wages were supported by the ministry. However, it's unclear on future years.

1st and 2nd reading May 16th Budget open house – June 6th 3rd and final reading – June 20th

Early Learning and Childcare, Lisa Lainchbury, Assistant Superintendent and Kim Anderson, District Principal of Early Learning and Inclusion

- Early Learning 0 to age 8 (grade 4)
- Activities for families on website Ministry of Education and Child Care.www.gov.bc.ca/earlylearning
- Supports for families will support children all the way through their education
- First people's principals are blended and consistently overlap with Early learning
- District goal is outlined in the strategic plan. Helps with transition into kindergarten and through to grade 4.
- Inspire curiosity, discovery and belonging to honor all children and how they naturally learn.
- Langley has a multitude of early learning programs. Key highlighted programs
 - Welcome center (DGR) provides interactive informative sessions (i.e. come as you are sessions) shares information from local providers and community partners
 - Ready, Set Learn Gifts and Gatherings 3 yrs to 5yrs with parent participating beside them. Focus on gifts that children bring. Stories, seasons and early learning principles within sessions. Flyer is on the website. Pre K programs
 - Strong Start 7 locations (DGR, Langley meadows, Nicomekl, Parkside, Simonds, West Langley and Willoughby) invite conversation and a great place for networking and to connect with the school community and allows children to become aware of the school community.
 - Before & After School care Parkside Centennial School and Shortreed Community School. 2 schools were licensed to allow for before and after care when Active Beyond the Bell was no longer being offered.
 - Seamless Day Kindergarten Nicomekl and Parkside are being offered.
 Provide secondary learning and teaching for the entirety of the day. Creates deepened learning connections
 - JB4 Preschool Douglas Park Elementary (not a school readiness program) it's a play based engaging program Mon/ Wed /Fri allows connections for students until they start kindergarten in the fall.

All programs are offered to families in the district. Learn more on the website to see the flyer. Encouraged to take part and create the connection with the school district before kids enter Kindergarten.

Q: Will the Before and After-school programs be able to be offered to other schools that used to have Active Beyond the Bell program that is no longer offered?

A: They are in discussions right now. Ministry, Township and Province mandate is to provide more spaces. This is underway to find space and support families the best they can.

Trustee Report: Joel Neufeld

No new reports from the board. There will be a lot coming up in the next three meetings before the break.

Superintendent Report - Mal Gill, SD 35 Superintendent Stategic plan final copy being brought forward to April 25th public meeting

Walnut Grove asbestos incident prespring break – they went above and beyond in terms of testing and abatement. It was important to make sure there were no further issues and at a little extra cost elected to pursue abatement. Work safe was brought in and assisted with the process

In March Bandits vs RCMP, Fire and Foundry and had a mini tournament! Great opportunity to connect with students and was a fun event.

Minister of Education came through the school district while the schools were empty during spring break to educate and see what developments are coming in and a review of space and schools. Showing how families that are moving in can't be in the school that is across the street from their home.

March 31, 2023 – official last day for K registration. While parents can still register, they do start placement right after this date.

2025/2026 school calendar has been posted – pro d days are not written in stone as of yet. This is to allow families to plan, but not yet confirmed. Detailed calendar with professional development days will be going to reg board meeting April.

Q: Walnut Grove Questions Asbestos – Any workplace that has potential for asbestos. Can you tell us if the school district does inventories of the schools. Do we have management plans? Are the PACs able to look at, to allow parents to be informed?

A: Yes, inventories done, yes management plans in place. Not confirmed if it can be shared.

Q: How did it come as a surprise in Walnut Grove?

A: They reviewed the info of the school in 1990. The builder made a choice, and the SD was not aware it was there.
