CAREERS

CAREER LIFE CONNECTIONS 11/CAPSTONE 12

This course is required for graduation and will be taken in grade 11 and 12. Students meet with their teacher in their Life Connections/Capstone block within their MAJOR. Students will be required to complete the two components of the course: curricular work and a final Capstone project. This is a culminating project which students will demonstrate their learning and growth in an area of interest or passion. Students must present their Capstone proposal to one of the Career Facilitators by the end of their grade 11 year prior to commencing the project. In their Grade 12 year, students will present their Capstone project in a final presentation.

CAPSTONE

The capstone is a rigorous learning opportunity for students to reflect and share in personally meaningful ways, and is a requirement for Career-Life Connections and for graduation. The purpose of the capstone is for students to demonstrate the knowledge, competencies, and passion(s) that they can offer the world, as they integrate personal interests and strengths with preferred future possibilities. It is a representation of the student's learning journey and provides an opportunity to reflect and synthesize as well as showcase and celebrate.

The capstone includes, but is not limited to, two stages:

- The capstone project students design, research, and present.

Youth Train in Trades

What is Youth Train in Trades?

Funded by Industry Training Authority BC (ITA) and the BC Ministry of Education. Students can receive credits towards their high school diploma and at least one level of post-secondary technical training by attending trades training classes at local high schools, post secondary institutions or ITA-certified training facilities.

Youth Work in Trades (WRK)

What is Youth Work in Trades?

Funded by ITA and the BC Ministry of Education. This program offers up to 4 high school elective courses to high school students worked towards an apprenticeship in Trades under the supervision of a certified tradesperson.

Student Benefits

- Earn up to 16 credits (4 WRK courses) for paid work with a certified tradesperson
- Get a head start on career
- Working hours count towards Apprenticeship (dual credits)
- Work outside of school hours at a real workplace (weekend, summer, spring break, etc.
- Find own employer or connect with employers with assistance of WRK teacher
- May be eligible for a **\$1000** Youth Work In Trades Award
- Where to take the course?
 - Schoolwork will be done with District WRK teacher at LFAS or online
 - Work hours will be completed at a workplace

Numeracy/Literacy Assessment

Students must complete the two new graduation assessments which will replace provincial exams.

Most universities are not using results for entrance assessment (UBC: 3 or 4 required on Lit 12).

Numeracy Assessment

- ▶ The Numeracy Assessment was introduced in 2018.
- All students will write the Grade 10 numeracy assessment.
- Marked based on a rubric (1 to 4)

Literacy Assessment

- All students need to write 2 Literacy assessments (Gr.10 & 12).
- Graduation Requirement
- Marked based on a rubric (1 to 4)

Quick Facts

- The Graduation Numeracy Assessment is a new provincial assessment and a graduation requirement for all students.
- The Graduation Numeracy Assessment is not tied to a specific math course. Rather, it evaluates a student's numeracy skills developed over the course of their education.
- Students will take the assessment in Grade 10.
- Students can re-take the Graduation Numeracy Assessment to improve their proficiency score. Their best level achieved will be counted as their final result.
- Results will be reported using a proficiency scale.
- Students will access results and a personalized performance report through the <u>StudentTranscripts Service</u>.
- The Graduation Numeracy Assessment typically requires two hours to complete; however, students may use an additional hour if they require the extra time.

Will results be considered by post-secondary institutions?

Each post-secondary institution has the authority to determine admission requirements for students. Some have already indicated they will not use the Graduation Numeracy Assessment for admissions at this time. It is possible others will use it to inform decisions on admissions. Students may wish to contact the institution they are applying to for more information.

Employers may also be interested in a student's assessment results, as evidence of their achievement in numeracy.

Indigenous Focused Graduation Requirement

Frequently Asked Questions

Q1. When does this requirement take effect?

The new requirement will be implemented in the 2023/24 school year. It will be necessary for any student graduating in the 2023/24 school year, and in all subsequent years, to meet this new requirement.

Q2. Will all students need to complete this requirement?

Yes, all students working towards the BC Certificate of Graduation (Dogwood Diploma, in both English and French) will be required to complete the new graduation requirement, including students at B.C. independent and certified offshore schools.

Q3. Will the new requirement impact students' transitions to post-secondary?

No, the model includes options for students to meet the new requirement through completion of existing provincial courses which are already accepted by postsecondary institutions in Canada.

For post-secondary programs offered outside of Canada, or with highly specific entrance requirements, students could potentially choose a Grade 10 level course or include the new requirement as an elective.

The new requirement aligns with actions taken by public post-secondary institutions to introduce required Indigenous education coursework for students, including BC teacher education programs and UBC School of Law.

Meeting the requirement

Four credits, of the 80 credits required to graduate with a BC Certificate of Graduation, must include an Indigenous-focused course(s) (the typical BC course is 4 credits).

Current options that students can choose from:

Provincial courses

- Eight English First Peoples courses, Grades 10-12, BC First Peoples 12 and Contemporary Indigenous Studies 12.
- These courses also satisfy other graduation requirements in English language Arts and Social Studies.
- For a full list of Provincial course options, including credit values of each course, please see the Ministry website.

First Nations language courses

- 18 First Nations Language courses, Grades 10-12.
- For a full list of First Nations language course options, please see the Ministry website.

Why the change?

This change to the BC Graduation program represents an important next step towards lasting and meaningful reconciliation. The new graduation requirement will provide all B.C. students with the necessary time and opportunity to develop a deeper understanding of the experiences, cultures, histories, and contemporary contexts of Indigenous peoples in Canada.

The Indigenous-focused graduation requirement responds to commitments in the Action Plan for the *Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act* and is consistent with the obligations in the BC Tripartite Education Agreement.

The new requirement also reflects ongoing work by the Ministry of Education and Child Care, the First Nations Education Steering Committee, and other education partners to address Indigenous-specific racism in the K-12 education system.








UBC's Academic Assessment

Breadth of coursework	 Students are recommended to take at least <u>six</u> Grade 12 level courses Applicants presenting a heavier course load (in Grade 11 and 12) may be advantaged
Rigour of coursework	 Students are encouraged to challenge themselves in school Applicants presenting courses that contain rigorous/first-year university content may be advantaged
Relevancy of coursework	 Students are encourage to pursue courses that are relevant to their intended are of study at UBC (even if the course marks are not used); those who do so may be advantaged
Personal circumstances	 In some cases, it may not be possible to demonstrate breadth, rigour, and/or additional relevant courses. Applicants can provide information about this and will be considered on a case-by-case basis

How can l increase my chances for admission to UBC?

- Get good grades in all your classes, particularly those related to what you want to study at UBC. All learning in secondary school is important and can help you gain admission.
- Pursue your academic interests. Take a breadth of coursework. And don't worry about experimenting with a new subject; UBC will not look at your lowest grade so long as it is not related to what you want to study at UBC.
- If you do poorly in an important subject at the Grade 11 level and don't want UBC to use the grade, take the course at the Grade 12 level; UBC will only look at the senior grade.
- Having the highest grades is not the only way to get in challenging yourself by taking more courses, courses that are related to what you want to study at UBC, and courses that are academically rigorous can also be beneficial.

DISCUSS CHOICES WITH THE ADULTS IN YOUR WORLD

PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY 12

Are you interested in learning about the physical world around you? In geography, we explore earthquakes, tsunamis, volcanic eruptions, landslides and other natural hazards while also gaining an understanding of how interconnected processes shape the Earth. Impacts of human activities on the natural environment such as with the oil and gas industry are also discussed. The course is a visually engaging exploration of our world which is guaranteed to change how you see everything from the clouds above you to the rocks beneath your feet.

PHILOSOPHY 12

Philosophy 12 will act as an introduction to a massive study of thinking and being. We begin the course in Plato's Cave, and emerge as we explore philosophical thinkers through time, from Aristotle to Zimbardo. Students will form inquiry questions about philosophical topics, and answer them as we sample the streams of Metaphysics, Epistemology, Logic and Reasoning, Ethics and Morality, and Aesthetics. Through socratic seminars, debates, and social experiments, with the aid of film, story, and argument, we will question our assumptions and learn to use logic to defend our chosen values.

PSYCHOLOGY 12

Psychology 12 is a combination of basic theory and broad topics. It provides information relating to issues that all individuls encounter not only in themselves, but also in their relationships with others. We dive into developmental psychology, social psychology, learning and cognition, stress and motivation, neuroscience and much more. Students will gain an appreciation for research, experimentation, psychological history and get a good taste for what a career in psychology could look like.

Please note – this course will not fulful your required Social Studies 12 credit. This is an elective course.

SOCIAL JUSTICE 12

Martin Luther King, Jr., Ghandi, Mother Teresa and Malala Yousafzai are just a few of the people who have been champions of Social Justice. This course will examine the complex causes and interconnectedness of Social Justice as well as initiatives to transform systemic injustice, and how individual world views shape and inform the understanding of


