The program, in partnership with University of the Fraser Valley (UFV), allows students to complete FOUR courses towards their Early Childhood Education Certificate. Students earn these post-secondary credits while also receiving credits towards high school graduation.

Program Prerequisites

Tuition, Program Fees and Credentials Earned

Dual Credit programs are only offered to registered SD35 students. At the time of application, students must:

- Be registered in the Langley School District
- Be 18 or younger on June 30 of application year
- Have not graduated from high school before starting the program
- Be on track to graduate

Prerequisites

Have completed before the start of the program:

- Grade 11
- English 11

Recommended:

- C+ or higher in English 10 and Math 10
- Experience working with children



Tuition and Program Fees

- Tuition is paid by the Langley School District (value of approximately \$2500)
- Student pays approximately \$500 for textbooks and supplies (kept by the student after the program)
- Partial bursary available for students requiring financial assistance

Credits and Courses

- Credit for 4 post-secondary courses (12 credits)
- Credit for 4 high school courses (16 credits)
- ECE 100: Recognize the major theories of human development, cognitive and social-emotional development from conception through the age of five.
- ECE 103: Implement recording techniques for observing the children's social, play, language, motor, and cognitive development.
- ECE 101: Identify the historical and philosophical influences that have contributed to shaping the current practice of ECE.
- CMNS 125: Develop your ability to effectively communicate with children, parents, and colleagues.
 The emphasis is on the communication process, and on direct, indirect, and persuasive messages and presentations. This course is transferable to other programs.

Career Outlook

- Graduates find work in daycares, preschools, nursery schools, public schools, and infant or toddler centres.
- ECE Dual Credit is a stepping stone to education and social work.
- Early Childhood Educators and Assistants are sixth on the Globe and Mail's list of the 10 jobs expected to be in highest demand in B.C. for the next decade.
