

## When is my child eligible for kindergarten in British Columbia?

Most families enroll their child in kindergarten for September in the year of their 5th birthday.

### Is my child required to go to kindergarten?

School is optional for five year olds in British Columbia. A few families wait until the next year, when their child turns 6. It is up to you, as their parent, to make that decision.

# Is my child ready for a full day of kindergarten?

Every child develops at his or her own level and speed. Talk to your school principal, or kindergarten teacher, about how to ease your child's transition to kindergarten and to ease your mind.

### When will my child start kindergarten?

Langley kindergarten teachers welcome children to school in different ways. At first your child will attend school in a small group for a shorter length of time than the regular 5 hour session. This is called gradual entry. Your child's school will send you further information before kindergarten begins in September.

# Why is gradual entry to kindergarten necessary?

Gradual entry allows the teacher time to get to know your child as an individual and to help your child become comfortable with the classroom. For information on full day kindergarten see the Langley School District website: www.sd35.bc.ca

### Why Full Day Kindergarten?

- The purpose of full day Kindergarten is to enhance children's overall development not to rush them into academics at an earlier age.
- Full day learning is associated with improved reading and numeracy, smoother transitions to Grade 1, and increased post-secondary graduation rates.
- Research shows that a play-based kindergarten program helps children to succeed in school and in life.
- Experiences in early childhood shape future learning habits.
