
Our Music department has also been very busy these past few weeks. In addition to their contributions to the



All Grads must be photographed for the yearbook and class composite.



We ask that you read **all the information** carefully. You will find answers to the majority of, if not all, your questions. Please contact Vibrant Photos directly at 604-380-3388 if you still require assistance.

Choose one of the following options when booking your retake (Please sign up for <u>ONE</u> photo slot only).

- **Full Grad sitting** (\$50+service fee): Book this option for a first time appointment for a full sitting or if you had a yearbook only session and now want a full sitting.
- Yearbook only, first time sitting (no charge): Book this option if you are wanting yearbook only photos and it's a first time appointment.
- **Retake Sitting** (\$20+service fee): Book this option if you are coming for retakes. This includes retakes for any part of your sitting you want redone and also applies to any Grad that wants their yearbook only photos redone.

STUDENT DROP OFF & PICK UP


We have received some feedback with respect to the parking lot and drop-off and pickup before and after school. As you know, we have a very large school population. We have approximately 2200 students attending WGSS this year. Consequently, the morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up can be very busy and our school grounds and surrounding roadways become very congested.

Based on feedback from students, families and community members, we thought it would be helpful to send a few reminders:

- Please do not drop-off or pick-up students along Walnut Grove Drive. This is unsafe.
- If you can drop-off or pick-up your student in a neighbouring area that is not as busy, that would be helpful.
- Please do not park in the parking lots of our neighbouring Townhouse Complexes.
 This creates situations where residents are not able to park in their own homes and makes it more difficult for them to navigate their internal roadways.
- If you can stagger your drop-off times (a little earlier) or pick-up times (a little later) that would also help to alleviate congestion.
- Please be mindful of blocking lanes if you are coming through the front of the school:
 - Please make room for our buses to be able to park and maneuver in the parking lot.
 - Please do not park in the lanes in front of the parking stalls; this holds up traffic and prevents cars from leaving the parking spots.
 - Please do not park in the designated bus zones.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS, POWER OUTAGES, AND SCHOOL CLOSURES

With storm season upon us, the District is reminding families about procedures during emergencies such as power outages. The District will post important information on school and District websites as well as on social media channels. The District may also send special instructions in emails and text messages (for those that opt-in) via



SchoolMessenger. In the event of power outages, schools have an emergency phone line operational. Please avoid calling the school unless it is an emergency as this ties up the phone line.

As per the District's procedures, schools in the District may be closed to students by the Superintendent for weather related emergencies such as power outages or other causes related to health and safety. The decision to close a school due to a power outage is based on many considerations including expected power restoration time, operational emergency lighting, access to water and washrooms, among other factors. As always, it is a parent's decision whether to send their child to school (or keep their child at school) based on safety and individual circumstances. If you feel it is unsafe for you or your child to travel to or attend an open school for any reason, please keep your child home and report an absence to the school. INFORMATION ABOUT SCHOOL STATUS DURING INCLEMENT WEATHER

Snow closures and power outages are an annual occurrence in the Langley School District. So, where do you go to get information about the status of schools during periods of inclement weather? If you are able to access the internet via computer or smartphone, current information about Langley schools can be accessed on all school websites or www.sd35.bc.ca. Updates are also posted to X (formerly Twitter) @LangleySchools and Facebook at www.facebook.com/langleyschooldistrict. If you don't have internet connectivity but your phone is working, call a relative or friend in an area that has not been affected by the storm and ask them to check the district website for you. Local radio stations are also informed of school status in Langley. Tune in to CKWX 1130AM, CKNW 980AM, Country Radio 107.1FM, Pulse 107.7 or CBC 690AM or 88.1FM for updates.

Please note that Langley District schools are all considered 'open' until a decision to close is required. Decisions on school closures are usually made by 6:30am. As always, it is a parent's decision whether to send their child to school based on safety and individual circumstances. If you feel it is unsafe for you or your child to travel to or attend an open school for any reason, please keep your child home and report an absence to the school.

FRASER HEALTH INFORMATION

It's that time of year when we see a rise in illnesses impacting students and staff in our school. We are hearing from families about colds, respiratory illnesses, and stomach bugs

Dental, Hearing, and Vision Checks (from Fraser Health)

Health, safety, and wellness continue to be a priority in our schools. To help support our students and families, we are sharing important information from our community partner Fraser Health about dental, hearing, and vision checks. Please see below for helpful reminders to support your child.

Make dental, hearing and vision checks part of a healthy routine

Health screenings help find issues early which can make treatment easier and more effective. It's important for your child to have regular eye exams and routine dental checkups. It is also important to recognize any hearing loss early as this is essential for speech and language development. Read on to learn when and how to access services for your child.

Dental

Tooth decay is the most common, but preventable, childhood chronic disease. It is important to establish good oral hygiene at a young age and have children's teeth checked by a dentist regularly. To find a local dentist near you who is accepting new patients, visit the BC Dental Association's Find a Dentist database. If you are a member of a low-income family and you do not have extended health coverage, there are several programs that can help you access affordable dentistry for your children. You can also contact the dental program at your local public health unit and ask about resources available in your community.

Vision

<u>BC Doctors of Optometry</u> recommends children receive their first eye exam when they are six to nine months old with a follow up exam at least once between the ages of two and five and then yearly once they enter school. You can find an optometrist accepting new patients near you at the College of Optometrists of British Columbia's <u>Find an Optometrist database</u>. In B.C., one basic eye exam per year is free up to the age of 18.

Some optometrists may charge a user fee of about \$35-50 per visit, so be sure to ask about any fees before you make an appointment.

Hearing

Good hearing is essential for speech and language development and plays an important part in a child's social and emotional growth. It is important to recognize hearing loss early and seek out testing and treatment if needed. Fraser Health's Public Health community audiologists provide hearing services for children from birth to 19 years of age. If you have a concern about your child's hearing, referrals can be made by a parent or caregiver, a health care provider or education professional to your <u>local public health audiology (hearing) clinic</u>.


COMMUNICATING STUDENT LEARNING (CSL)

WGSS PAC NEWS

Happy Friday everyone, from your WGSS PAC!

We held our November meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 12th at 7pm in the library, and had an excellent turn-out this month. If you haven't made it to a PAC meeting yet, please join us, we would love to see more and new faces at our meetings. Often, we see parents of new grade 8 students, which is great, but PAC meetings are relevant for parents and guardians of all students, regardless of grade. We know everyone is busy, and perhaps you've already given more time than you actually had when your kids were in elementary school. But we still need parent involvement at the high school level, and PAC meetings are a great way to air concerns and get questions answered. Please join us on the second Tuesday of the month, at 7pm in the WGSS Library.

The November meeting focused on appointing two representatives to attend District PAC meetings and report back to our PAC (thank you to Amy and Jared for volunteering their time), as well as voting on funding requests.

Every year, the BC Gaming Commission gives school PACs a certain amount of money to be spent supporting extra-curricular activities. In October, teachers and student club sponsors submit funding requests to the PAC, which are then voted on in November. Prior to voting, the PAC Executive goes through all requests to vet them for eligibility, as the BC Gaming Commission tightly regulates what funding can and cannot be used for. The Executive then recommends an amount to be approved per request, and this is voted on at the November meeting.

Requests that were approved this year include multiple student clubs (among them, for example, the Chess Club, Creative Minds, Literary Club, Rubik's Cube Club and Dungeons and Dragons), as well as funding for extracurricular sports such as volleyball, lacrosse and rugby. We also approved funding for Dry Grad, Grad Council and Tuff Wally (our annual Tough-Mudder style obstacle race that takes place in the spring). Finally, we were happy to be able to approve funding for several school beautification projects, such as a new sound system for the library which can be used by all student clubs, as well as the Music For Wellness program. Thank you to everyone who attended for your questions and comments and your time!

The PAC continues to ask for donations via SchoolCashOnline (please see our fundraiser flyer below). Donations go to the PAC's regular account, rather than our Gaming account, and it is from our regular account that we fund scholarships for graduating students, a project very dear to our hearts. BC Gaming Commission funds cannot be used for scholarships, and so we are dependent on fundraising. We would also like to raise funds

to continue to offer our Staff Appreciation event in the spring, where we express our appreciation to all teachers and staff for their hard work and time on our kids' behalf. Please donate! Any amount is welcome, and we appreciate whatever you can give.














Fairy Godmother Foundation

Once applications are reviewed your councellor will contact you with further details


