2. Register for an account by clicking the "**REGISTER**" menu tab and filling in the on-line form. Choose a user id and password for yourself and then click the "**Register Now**" button.

3. Add your children into the system by clicking the "Add a Student" button. Click the "Insert New" button to add more children.

4. Click the "date" icon beside each child's name to schedule appointments. Select the staff you wish to book appointments with and the "View Calendars" button. Use the "Ctrl" or "Command" key to select multiple staff to view at the same time.

5. Click on available time slots to book your appointments to make your bookings.

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Make dental, hearing and vision checks part of a healthy routine

Health screenings help find issues early which can make treatment easier and more effective. It's important for your child to have regular eye exams and routine dental checkups. It is also important to recognize any hearing loss early as this is essential for speech and language development. Read on to learn when and how to access services for your child.

Dental

Tooth decay is the most common, but preventable, childhood chronic disease. It is important to establish good oral hygiene at a young age and have children's teeth checked by a dentist regularly. To find a local dentist near you who is accepting new patients, visit the BC Dental Association's <u>Find a Dentist database</u>. If you are a member of a low-income family and you do not have extended health coverage, there are several programs that can help you access <u>affordable dentistry for your children</u>. You can also contact the dental program at your <u>local public health unit</u> and ask about resources available in your community.

Vision

<u>BC Doctors of Optometry</u> recommends children receive their first eye exam when they are six to nine months old with a follow up exam at least once between the ages of two and five and then yearly once they enter school. You can find an optometrist accepting new patients near you at the College of Optometrists of British Columbia's <u>Find an Optometrist database</u>. In B.C., one basic eye exam per year is free up to the age of 18. Some optometrists may charge a user fee of about \$35-50 per visit, so be sure to ask about any fees before you make an appointment.

Hearing

Good hearing is essential for speech and language development and plays an important part in a child's social and emotional growth. It is important to recognize hearing loss early and seek out testing and treatment if needed. Fraser Health's Public Health community audiologists provide hearing services for children from birth to 19 years of age. If you have a concern about your child's hearing, referrals can be made by a parent or caregiver, a health care provider or education professional to your <u>local public health audiology (hearing) clinic</u>.

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PARENT CORNER:

As we continue to foster an inclusive and supportive environment for all our students, I want to follow up on our last parent corner blog on the importance of anti-racism education. Our commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion is unwavering, and it is crucial that we work together to address and combat racism in all its forms. All staff, students and families deserve to come to a school where they feel safe and that is our goal for Noel Booth. Anti Racism education is a shared responsibility between school and home. Only by working together can we move forward.

Addressing Racism in Everyday Conversations with Your Children

Talking about racism with your children is essential for fostering an inclusive and respectful mindset. Here are some strategies to help guide these important discussions:

1. Start Early and Be Honest

- **Begin Conversations Early**: Children can recognize differences in skin color from a very young age. Starting discussions about race and diversity early helps build a foundation of understanding.
- **Be Honest**: Use clear and age-appropriate language to explain what racism is and why it is wrong. Avoid avoiding difficult topics or sugar-coating the truth.

2. Encourage Open Dialogue

- **Listen Actively**: Pay attention to your child's questions and thoughts about race. Validate their feelings and provide thoughtful responses.
- **Ask Questions**: Encourage your child to express their thoughts and ask questions. This helps them process their experiences and understand different perspectives.

3. Use Everyday Moments

- **Teach Through Daily Interactions**: Use everyday situations, such as watching TV or reading books, to discuss race and diversity. Point out and challenge stereotypes when you see them.
- **Discuss Current Events**: Talk about news stories or events related to race and racism. This helps children understand the real-world impact of these issues.

4. Model Inclusive Behaviour

- Lead by Example: Demonstrate inclusive behavior in your interactions. Show respect and kindness to people of all backgrounds.
- **Challenge Your Own Biases**: Reflect on your own attitudes and behaviors. Address any biases you may have and show your child that learning and growth are ongoing processes.

5. Provide Diverse Experiences

- **Expose to Diversity**: Introduce your child to diverse cultures through books, movies, and activities. Celebrate different cultural traditions and holidays.
- **Create an Inclusive Environment**: Ensure that your home environment reflects diversity. This can include diverse toys, art, and media.

6. Promote Empathy and Justice

• **Teach Empathy**: Help your child understand and empathize with the experiences of others. Discuss how racism affects people and why it is important to stand against it.

• **Encourage Advocacy**: Teach your child to speak up against racism and support those who are marginalized. Show them how to be an ally.

By incorporating these strategies into your daily interactions, you can help your child develop a strong, anti-racist mindset and contribute to a more inclusive society.

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School Newsletter

Immunizations for Grade 6 students are coming

When students are in Grade 6, we review their immunization records and offer all routine vaccines they need for their age. We will send home a consent package.

When I receive the consent package for my child or the child in my care, what do I do?

- $\checkmark\,$ Review the consent package, which includes past immunizations, with the child.
- ✓ Check that the child's immunization record is complete. If it is not complete, you can submit the missing record one of these ways:
 - Include it with the signed consent form, or
 - Submit it online to us at FraserHealth.ca/immunizationform.
- ✓ Talk with the child about why vaccines are important.
- ✓ Complete and sign the consent form. Note: The consent is valid for 2 years from the date it is given unless you cancel it. It can be used for any vaccines the student missed.
- ✓ Return the signed consent form, and the missing immunization record if needed, to the school sealed in the envelope provided.

All routine vaccines are free in British Columbia.
