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Halloween Pumpkin Carving

- AM Group 1 Pumpkin carves in the gym with buddies (9:00-10:00ish) AM Group 2 Pumpkin carves in the gym with buddies (10:40-12:00ish). Pumpkins stay in the gym. PAC lights (electric) candles in the pumpkins in the gym.
- Halloween Parade starts at 1:45 in K and weaves its way through the school (last class is Wass Division 3). We will play music over the PA during this time. It ends in the gym and we see the carved pumpkins. We have a group song dance time (Monster Mash). Students go back to class with teachers. Students come back to the gym at the end of the day to pick up their pumpkin. For parents, your children will likely need assistance in transporting the pumpkins home from the school.

Halloween Expectations for Students- Costume Guidelines

- **Appropriateness**: Costumes should be school-appropriate and respectful of all cultures and identities. Avoid costumes that may be offensive or insensitive.
- **Safety**: Ensure that costumes do not obstruct vision or movement. Avoid masks that cover the entire face and costumes that include weapons or sharp objects.
- **Comfort**: Students should be able to participate in regular school activities comfortably. Costumes should not interfere with learning or physical activities.

As we continue to foster an inclusive and supportive environment for all our students, I want to follow up on our last parent corner blog on the importance of anti-racism education. Our commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion is unwavering, and it is crucial that we work together to address and combat racism in all its forms. All staff, students and families deserve to come to a school where they feel safe and that is our goal for Noel Booth. Anti Racism education is a shared responsibility between school and home. Only by working together can we move forward.

Understanding Anti-Racism Education

Anti-racism education involves actively identifying and opposing racism by changing systems, organizational structures, policies, practices, and attitudes. It is about creating a culture where all students feel valued and respected, regardless of their race or ethnicity. In our school, we are dedicated to integrating anti-racism principles into our curriculum and daily interactions.

What Can Be Done at Home

Parents and guardians play a vital role in reinforcing these values at home. Here are some ways you can support anti-racism education:

School Newsletter

Immunizations for Grade 6 students are coming

When students are in Grade 6, we review their immunization records and offer all routine vaccines they need for their age. We will send home a consent package.

When I receive the consent package for my child or the child in my care, what do I do?

- ✓ Review the consent package, which includes past immunizations, with the child.
- ✓ Check that the child's immunization record is complete. If it is not complete, you can submit the missing record one of these ways:
 - Include it with the signed consent form, or
 - Submit it online to us at FraserHealth.ca/immunizationform.
- ✓ Talk with the child about why vaccines are important.
- ✓ Complete and sign the consent form. Note: The consent is valid for 2 years from the date it is given unless you cancel it. It can be used for any vaccines the student missed.
- ✓ Return the signed consent form, and the missing immunization record if needed, to the school sealed in the envelope provided.

All routine vaccines are free in British Columbia.

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
