1. Campbell Valley Regional Park

Address: 20285 8 Ave

This park has 29km of trails for hiking and other activities such as bird watching, dog walking, and picnicking are also popular among the residents of Langley. This park has various trails for all kinds of uses, such as cycling and even horse riding. Each entrance has picnic tables where you can enjoy nature with family and friends, and large trees along the Little River Loop Trail that you can spend time under.

2. Derby Reach Regional Park

Derby Reach Regional Park is famous not only for its walking trails but also for its camping site and fishing areas. The Edge Farm Trail also has lots of birds among the shores of the water, which are covered with trees and bushes. 3. Aldergrove Park

Address: 26845 27 Ave




UBC PHYSICS OLYMPIC COMPETITION

Our school team this year consists of 28 students who are passionate about Physics. Before the competition, the students met several times every week at lunch as well as before and after school. During this time, three grade 12 students - Eric Chen, Isabelle Han, and Coco Zhang - led brief lessons to prepare the team for the astronomy lab.

On March 5th, 2022, REMSS students participated in the annual UBC Physics Olympics Competition. Out of over 50 participating schools across the lower mainland, the team achieved an overall 3rd place.

The competition includes a pre-built project of moving a smart phone from the table surface to the floor with minimum acceleration, Fermi questions that are focused on estimation of real-world physical quantities, analysis of astronomy lab about exo-planet detection, and two rounds of multiple-choice general physics questions. With support from Mr. Klassen and Mr. Carroll, and hours of collaborative work by the team members, the team built an elevator for a smartphone using a water tower and raft system which lowered the acceleration to under 2m per second squared. The elevator was ranked 3rd out of all the submissions.

This experience inspired learning and creativity for REMSS students beyond the academic curriculum. Moreover, it was a growth and bonding opportunity for students to work towards a common goal, achieving together as a team.





Officially as of Friday, March 11th, the BC government announced a long-awaited lifting of its indoor mask mandate due to an observed decrease in hospitalizations and increase in vaccination rates. Furthermore, businesses may now choose their own regulations regarding masking. Masking is no longer mandatory, but is strongly encouraged in tight indoor spaces with less social distancing. While our school adopts the ministry's mask mandate for the K-12 school system, we also recognize and value students' and staffs' individual choices. - I'm happy [about the mask mandate release], I find my mask annoying, and I respect everyone's decision. However, I will keep it on for other people to feel safer.
- I respect everyone's opinion and I can't judge people [for wearing or not wearing masks] because they all have personal circumstances. I wear a mask because without it I look ugly.
- I understand everyone's choice, and I believe we just have to coexist with the virus. If I don't wear a mask, I will self-consciously distance myself. If I wear a mask, I feel safer to be closer to people. I still think there may be a danger though.
